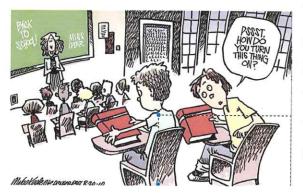
Fall greetings to all of you! We are rounding out the end of the first quarter (October 14th) and are figuring out the ins and outs of the new English reading arts curriculum. You may have heard your child talk about CKLA or mCLASS. CLKA is our main reading curriculum and mCLASS is an intervention piece that we are using to coincide with that instruction. Through mCLASS students are progress monitored and grouped at their specific ability levels.

Teachers completed training this summer with CKLA and continue to learn how to best implement the curriculum into the classroom. With this new curriculum we are noticing a change in how we typically assess children formatively. Formative assessments are assessments that we complete while students are in the learning process. End of the unit assessments that we use are characterized as summative assessments. As we work through this transition you may notice a change in how we are reporting grades in the gradebook. We ask for some patience as we navigate this change.

Fall weather always requires layers of clothing! For little ones, it is sometimes hard for them to keep track of all of their shed layers. Please check into our lost and found if you are missing something. Also, continue to have your child wear layers as the mornings are quite chilly.

THE IMPORTANCE OF SLEEP

Hello everyonel

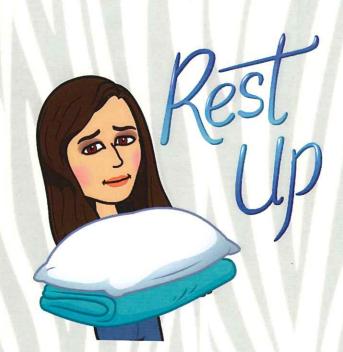
Whether you are in 2nd grade, a senior in high school, a parent, or a teacher, we all benefit from healthy sleep habits. Sleep promotes a strong memory, facilitates learning, recharges our mental and physical batteries, and generally helps us make the most out of our days. With quality sleep, we improve our mental and physical health, reduce stress, and can maintain a routine that is critical to having a healthy day. The ideal amount of sleep needed for each person may vary, but generally research suggests we need between 7-9 hours of sleep each night.

For both children and adults, sleep plays a critical role in helping our bodies and minds recover. As a result, sleep contributes to improvements in learning and promotes regulatory functions such as emotional and behavioral control that are important for each and every day. Since sleep plays such a crucial role in human functioning, lack of sleep can lead to a number of consequences including irritability, hyperactivity, poor impulse control, difficulty multitasking, impaired memory, and poor calculation skills.

Are you having trouble sleeping or staying asleep? There are many aspects that can affect our ability to fall asleep and stay asleep. If you are experiencing either of these, try reflecting on that amount of screen time allowed right before bed, the sleeping atmosphere (noise, temperature, light), caffeine intake, and the consistency of bedtime throughout the week and weekend. Changes you can make to optimize your sleep schedule can include: participating in relaxing activities before bed (taking a warm bath, listening to music, reading a book), keeping your bedroom cool, dark, and quiet, exercising during the day and not close to bedtime, maintaining a consistent sleep routine all seven days of the week, and adjusting your schedule to allow for enough time to sleep.

Hello Tiny Tigers! I am so excited to welcome 31 total preschool friends to our program this year! Here are a few helpful pieces of information about the Tiny Tigers Preschool program.

Location-All preschool classes will be located at our Tiny Tigers Early
Learning Center, across the street from the K-12 building. This facility is
equipped with classrooms for 3 preschool groups. It has its own cafeteria, indoor
recess space, library, lunchroom, and a fenced outdoor play space.

Teachers-Ms. Dawn Tedmon is our PreK 3 teacher. This year in PreK 4 students will be split into two groups between myself and Ms. Whitney Hubbard. We are all so excited to spend this year helping our community's littlest learners grow!

Classes-PreK 3 is for students who are age 3 prior to August 1st. There is a morning session, and an afternoon session of PreK 3. Sessions run from 8:00-11:30 and 12:00-3:30. PreK 4 is for students who are age 4 prior to August 1st. PreK 4 has one session running preschool focus hours from 8:00-1:00 and supplemental activities until the end of the school day. If families wish to pick up their child after focus hours are concluded they are welcome to do so.

Transportation-All preschool students are welcome to ride the AM and PM public school bus routes. A midday route will run to and from eligible daycare centers for PreK 3 students. Transportation will not be provided by the school at the conclusion of PreK 4 focus hours at 1:00.

Schedule-The preschool program will operate Monday through Thursday. There are no preschool classes on Fridays. We follow the same schedule as the K-12 students in terms of late starts, early outs, and days off. The first day of preschool is set for Monday August 22nd. This is NOT the same date as the start for K-12 students.

Curriculum-We follow a play based curriculum...yes our students play most of the day! Learning through play is what is developmentally appropriate for preschoolers. As preschool teachers we provide hands-on play experiences that foster development in academic, emotional, social, physical, and language skills. These activities are themed based off of our students' interests - like dinosaurs, farming, and more!



At Tiny Tigers Preschool we are committed to teaching through play and student discovery. We believe that a caring mutually respectful atmosphere promotes the learning process. We feel families are a vital partner in the education of their child and strive to make those home connections strong. We cannot be more excited to get this school year underway, see you soon!

The 6^{th} graders are off to a great start so far this year! We have 23 students in our class, and they have

been very busy learning! We have a new Language Arts curriculum called My Perspectives. It requires the students to do a lot more higher-level thinking when they are reading and writing. It offers many different varieties of text for the students to read and analyze. The class has read a poem, memoir, and comic strip so far. We will be working on nonfiction narrative writing, and continue to read different genres of text. The theme of this first unit is Childhood. The essential question is: What are the difficulties and triumphs of childhood? This has been an excellent theme that the students have had great success making connections to.

In Social Studies we are currently learning about the Israelites, their culture, conflicts, and religion. We are studying Thermal Energy in Science and the Microbiome will be next.

Our class was fortunate enough to attend the 5th Annual Ag
Showcase at the Merrick County Fairgrounds again this year. This is a fantastic field trip put on by the Merrick County Extension and the UNL Extension, as well as the many generous donors that make it all possible and provide lunches for all that attend. This year we learned about pork production, popcorn, egg production and safety, harvest equipment and safety, water resources and irrigation, as well as the beef animal nutrition where the students all were able to put their hand inside a live heifer's stomach and feel what it ate, the walls of the stomach, and the heartbeat of the animal. It was an amazing, educational trip!

The English classroom is experiencing lots of change this year. An English class and a reading class for junior high students are no longer offered; however, these two classes are combined and are now called Middle School Language Arts II and III. Mrs. Green and I team teach these two classes. The junior high students now have 100 minutes of English/Language Arts each day. It is a new adventure for us, and we are hoping to see positive results for both the students and the teachers.

This year new textbooks are also being implemented for English students in grades G-11. The team selected myperspectives by Savvas. The series uses a variety of learning strategies from whole-class learning to small groups to independent work. The text selections allow students to struggle with support, which is excellent to prepare our students for the next grade level, the ACT, and college reading. We are working as a team to determine which strategies are best to use and how the strategies are impacting student learning. We are having great conversations!

Because of the new textbooks, we now have new novels to include in our lessons. I look forward to the challenge of finding quality texts that interest students. Seventh-grade students are reading Esperanza Rising by Pam Munoz-Ryan. We haven't read very much of this text, but several students are saying they really enjoy it. Ninth-grade students will read Farewell to Manzana: by Jeanne Wakatsuki Houston and James D. Houston. I look forward to learning students' reactions to both of these novels.

I am grateful for the ELA team and the selection of a new series. It was time to move forward since new standards were introduced in 2021. AS Walt Disney said, "Around here, however, we don't look backwards for very long. We keep moving forward, opening up new doors and doing new things, because we're curious...and curiosity keeps leading us down new paths."
